~You have 3 sizes of clothes in your closet

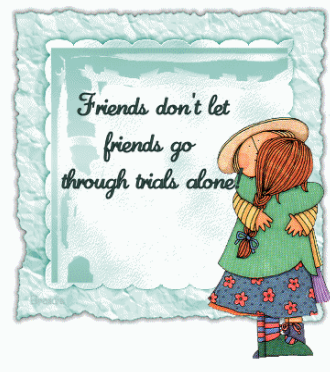

READING IS FUNDAMENTAL (RIF)

In 1966 a former teacher, Margaret McNamara took a bag of books to four boys in Washington D.C. whom she tutored in reading. When she told the children they could each choose a book to keep, their astonishment and delight led her to discover that they, and many of their classmates, had never owned any books. By the next summer, Mrs. McNamara had organized a group of school volunteers and in the fall of 1966 launched a book distribution program they called Reading Is Fundamental.

Today RIF is a national organization supported by the Department of Education, national foundations, and community groups at the local level. RIF has consistently grown over the years and during last year alone RIF volunteers across the country distributed books to 4.4 million children. The goal of RIF has remained the same since 1966, to provide children in need with high quality books at no cost their families. The mission of RIF is to help children understand the value of books, develop a greater interest in reading, and motivate parents and children to read together.

For the past nine years, GFWC-Charlotte has supported a RIF program in Charlotte. \$700 per year has been budgeted for RIF. Beautiful books are selected by the GFWC-Charlotte RIF committee and purchased at a very low cost through Scholastic Publishing Co. Two book distributions are held each year, one in the spring and one in the fall. Last year we distributed a total of 386 books to children in Charlotte schools.

Currently, we have three volunteers on the GFWC-Charlotte RIF committee. Last year these volunteers studied catalogs of books, ordered books, stamped each book with, "This is a gift from GFWC-Charlotte and RIF" stamp, and distributed books to students at Galewood, Washington, and Weymouth schools. This year we are working to include Parkview.

During a book distribution, each volunteer visits selected classrooms, reads stories to the children and displays the books so that each child is able to choose a book. We find that just as in 1966, many children have never owned books of their own and are thrilled to be able to choose and keep a book to take home. Some children take a long time in deciding on a book because of their excitement over having so many wonderful books from which to choose.

The RIF committee, on behalf of these children, would like to thank the members of GFWC-Charlotte for their continued support of this tremendous program. We believe RIF is one of the very worthwhile ways GFWC is serving our community.
