GFWC-Charlotte's International Project

At the December Tea, during her announcement concerning the book club, Tea and Tomes, Brynda Filkins mentioned the book that the group had read for the November gathering, Left to Tell: Finding God Amidst the Rwandan Holocaust by Immaculee Ilibagiza. Coincidentally, Brynda had just read an article in a Heifer International publication about Heifer's work in Rwanda and their innovative idea to help promote peace by the gifting of calves back and forth between rivaling factions. Because this action helped to bring a sense of community and sharing to people who had earlier been enemies, the project became known as "Cows for Peace."

When I returned home, I "Googled" (computer term to seek information from a variety of sources) "Cows for Peace" to learn more. One site related the story of a woman in Rwanda whose husband and son were massacred in front of her. She, her daughter, and her parents needed to hide themselves and live in abject poverty with absolutely no hope for a worthwhile future...maybe no future at all. After hearing about, applying for, and receiving a cow from Heifer International, the woman's life changed dramatically. With the proceeds from her cow's prolific milk production, she was ultimately able to provide her family with adequate food and shelter. She ultimately adopted five orphaned children.

It is with **utmost gratitude** to the ladies of GFWC-Charlotte who contributed to this year's international project that I am able to announce that not only did we collect **enough money** to purchase a "**Cow for Peace**," but we are also able to send another family a pig, sheep, or goat, and provide another family with a flock of chicks. **I cannot thank you enough for your generosity!!!**

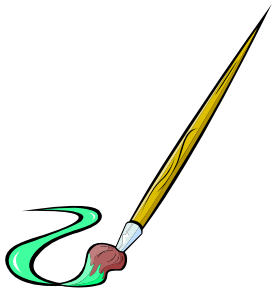
